

## **Breaches of the Basketball Victoria Code of Conduct**

The MEBA and Nunawading Junior Spectres program requires all coaches, players, parents and spectators to abide by the <u>Basketball Victoria Codes of conduct</u>

The Nunawading Junior Spectres Program (JSP) Committee and the Melbourne East Basketball Association (MEBA) also has the right to take disciplinary action against any player, coach, team manager, parent or spectator who does not abide by the Basketball Victoria Code of Conduct.

This document outlines the processes and consequences for breaches of the code of conduct by parents and spectators.

When a report of a breach is made MEBA will commission A Panel to make enquiries about the alleged breach.

The panel will consist of the JSP Executive Committee including at least one member of the MEBA board. The panel will decide what action/s should be taken on a case by case basis.

Disciplinary action for Nunawading Junior Spectres parents and spectators who have breached the code may include/and not be confined to Nunawading Junior Spectres **3 strike policy**.

The three strike policy will include but not be limited to:

- 1. The first substantiated breach of Basketball Victoria's Code of Conduct will involve a meeting with required parties and may result in the handing out a first warning.
- 2. The second breach of Basketball Victoria's Code of Conduct will result in a second warning and the parent/spectator may be suspended from attending any training/s and game/s until approved to return
- 3. The third breach of Basketball Victoria's code of conduct will result in the parent/spectator being permanently suspended from attending any training/s and game/s.

In all matters, breaches of conduct may at any time be referred to a tribunal at the discretion of the panel.
